An Analysis of Zainichi Koreans in Japan Youngchoon Cho

Abstract

Zainichi Koreans in Japan, who have lived in Japan feeling like outsiders of society for a long time, have also been facing identity crises as Koreans at the same time. They live in an unique and unnatural society created by surroundings. The Japanese government, the Korean peninsula, and Zainichi Koreans themselves are the causes.

I would like to reveal the mechanism of the process needed for creating today's awkward situations where Zainichi Koreans live. I would like to validate the history and the present situation of Zainichi Koreans, and from these elements, I also would like to elicit the possibilities that can be considered for Zainichi Koreans in Japan.

Next, I will focus on each generation of Zainichi Koreans in Japan with three questions to reveal what happened to them and what has transcended from generation to generation. Each generation seems to have had different sufferings, however, basically the roots are the same.

Finally, this paper suggests the transcendence from the postcolonial framework and the current nationality system. Only facing honestly their own identities, Zainichi Koreans in Japan can escape the crisis of extinguishment of their identities.

Abstract

An island country, the UK is now known as a multi-ethnic country. The Possible Risk of the Logic of Numerical Strength Midori Ito

Abstract

In this paper, I would like to explore how logic of numerical strength affects capitalism, democracy and mass media, and how people have formed opinions.

Taking up an example of problems of globalization, this paper will develop a framework for the analysis of media coverage about actual policies and the comparative difficulties of acquiring permanent residence status in Japan.

As is often the case, one's will has no connection with whether the person belongs to the majority or the minority. For example, ethnic Japanese people who have Japanese nationality comprise the minority in Japan, whereas, ethnic Koreans are the minority, not by any decision of their own.

It could be easier for the majority to change society because of majority rule. On the other hand, it is more difficult for a minority to effect change. Furthermore, the majority often fails to recognize the plight of minorities.

The majority cannot recognize its majority status on other occasions. Here, I argue that a society cannot allow the appeasement of the majority at the sacrifice of a minority.

A Confrontation over Internet Freedom: Google vs. China Keiichiro Kawakami

Abstract

In recent years, the Internet has made daily life especially convenient. We can obtain whatever information we want to know immediately on Yahoo or Google. The Internet has become an essential part of life. However, Google withdrew from the Chinese mainland on March 22, 2010 where the flow of information became too strictly regulated. In this case, both Google and the Chinese government maintain they had been acting in the best interest of the people of China. This case is an important issue involving the respect for freedom of information. That is, "Which opinion should be respected, Google's or the Chinese government's?" To answer this guestion, I referred to a book Justice: What's the Right Things to Do? The author, Michael Sandel, considers justice from three points of views which are happiness, freedom, and virtue. After considering his three aspects, I came to the decision that Google's freedom should be respected. This is because the Chinese government just thinks of protecting communism. In my view, communism focuses on near-term benefits and neglects the long-term benefit, which is the individual's right. China needs to remain more closely aligned with the global community if they want to continue accelerating economic growth and achieve a more important status as one of the world's front-runners.

Brazilians and Japanese: How do We Achieve a Japanese Multicultural Society?

Abstract

These days, more and more foreigners are living in Japan. Especially, this paper focuses on Brazilians living in Japan. They migrated to Japan as a worker, and the number of them has kept increasing over the past twenty years. However, as the number of Brazilians living in Japan increase, problems between them and Japanese people become increasingly serious. For example, Brazilians do not obey rules of throwing rubbish away, so Japanese people are perplexed with their attitude. The purpose of this paper is to think about "living together" through such a problem. To think about "living together", this paper analyzes some texts of communication problems and cultural problems between Brazilians living in Japan and Japanese people, and also problems of Brazilian children living in Japan. Through analyzing, this paper reveals mainly three things. Firstly, Brazilians living in Japan and Japanese people feel communication gaps when they are talking. By providing opportunities to learn Japanese for Brazilians living in Japan, and then by making places where Brazilians and Japanese people can communicate with each other, they will be able to live together more harmoniously than present situations.

Abstract

The Dispute over Cultural Property: A Case of the British Museum Akiko Watanabe

Abstract

After colonized countries progressively gain independence from suzerain power, have colonial problems become a matter of past history? I think that the influence of colonial administration is still in existence. This thesis focuses on the issue of cultural property as one of the influences of colonialism on the present. I refer to the controversy over requests for the removal of the Parthenon Sculptures and the Rosseta Stone, which are displayed at the British Museum.

The root source of this issue is a difference in perception of cultural property. In other words, it is the conflict between the universalism and cultural relativism. Renowned museums are proud of protecting many cultural treasures from the battle lines and do their best to pass them down to other generations.
